Pregnant Then Elected

On the evening of **Thursday 25th October**, Pregnant Then Screwed will be running their first in a series of events to encourage more mothers to start a career in Politics.

In the wake of the 'Pairing Scandal' (in which Jo Swinson MP was subjected to maternity discrimination by The Conservative Party Chief Whip), we are concerned that mothers are not being properly represented in Westminster. The most senior female politicians are childless - Theresa May, Nicola Sturgeon, Angela Merkel, and we know that specific barriers prevent mothers from starting a career in Politics. If mothers were properly represented in Parliament this would have an enormous impact on how the Government prioritises issues and how funding is allocated.

We believe that the protected characteristics of the equalities act need to be represented at the highest level to ensure legislation is appropriate for all citizens.

Mothers are facing enormous challenges under the current system. <u>54,000</u> women a year being forced out of their job for daring to procreate, (this figure has almost doubled in the last 10 years), a leaked NHS report has shown that only <u>2%</u> of mothers received treatment for postnatal depression yet research has shown that <u>81%</u> of pregnant women and new mums encounter at least one mental health issue, benefits are being slashed, and 75% of mothers are now in employment yet fathers have not increased their share of the domestic labour. The motherhood penalty is alive and well with the IFS stating that by the time a woman's first child is 12 years old, her hourly pay rate will be 33% behind a mans. The situation for mothers is deteriorating and without representation, it is difficult to see how things will improve.

Our plan is to give mothers the support they need to access the corridors of power. We will do this by: demystifying the process, conducting research into the barriers for mothers, working together to find solutions, and creating a robust and ongoing support network of mothers to pursue a Political career.
